Facilitators Guide

Keeper of My Home is a free educational resource that works towards improving awareness of First Nation housing, health, and safety by teaching children and young people about caring for a home. The delivery of the program is centred around four main themes:

- Traditional Teaching of the Community
- First Nation Housing Topics
- Home Maintenance
- Home Safety

Each theme has a learning objective designed explicitly for the grade level and aligns with provincial/territorial requirements. The curriculum includes classroom content and e-learning games that were created for teachers to deliver to students of all grades. By creating an activity book, we can further educate the students on the several topics within each theme in a fun and creative way.

In this activity book, you will cover four housing topics: the traditional teachings of respecting your home, exploring your community, responsibility at home, and the importance of safety rules. These activities will help you teach youth about the importance of caring for a home.

Activity: Word Tracing Trace the following words.




Activity: Reflection

In the box below, write down what respect means to you. Example: Respecting Mother Earth by not littering, respecting others by treating them with kindness, or respecting your parents by helping at home.


Activity: Colouring
