The First Nations Housing Professionals Association (FNHPA) is excited to announce its strategic expansion into Atlantic Canada, bringing its comprehensive education and support services to address the unique housing needs of First Nations communities in the region. Through a collaborative partnership with Indigenous Services Canada (ISC), FNHPA is committed to working alongside First Nations in New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Labrador, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island to enhance housing management and operations through targeted education, certification, and capacity-building initiatives.

As the leading Canadian organization for the certification and training of First Nations Housing Professionals, FNHPA is at the forefront of addressing housing challenges and developing critical resources for frontline workers. FNHPA's mandate is to create the capacity required to deliver housing programs, manage the multi-million-dollar assets constructed in communities, and effectively plan future housing projects, all while protecting both people and property.

FNHPA's innovative "two-eyed seeing" approach, which blends traditional First Nations perspectives with contemporary Western methodologies, ensures that our programs are not only culturally relevant but also highly effective. This "by First Nations, for First Nations" philosophy underpins all our initiatives, ensuring they resonate with and truly benefit the communities we serve. The goal is for every First Nation in Atlantic Canada to have at least one staff member who has achieved FNHP certification, with remaining staff completing the FNHPA Housing Management Assessment and Learning Pathway. This pathway equips them with a deep understanding of housing policies, tenant responsibilities, and best practices, ultimately creating a robust capacity plan.

"Our expansion into Atlantic Canada represents a key milestone in FNHPA's national strategy to provide region-specific support. We understand that each area comes with its own unique challenges and opportunities, and we are committed to working collaboratively with local communities to tailor our services to meet these regional needs. The newly hired Regional Coordinator for Atlantic Canada will be instrumental in fostering open dialogue, building partnerships, and co-developing strategies that directly address the housing challenges faced by First Nations in the region. By working closely with

We offer a wide range of resources and services designed to help these communities develop the capacity to manage their housing programs and assets successfully.

Ultimately, FNHPA is responding to the capacity and education gap by equipping staff with the certification and tools critical to managing their housing departments.
