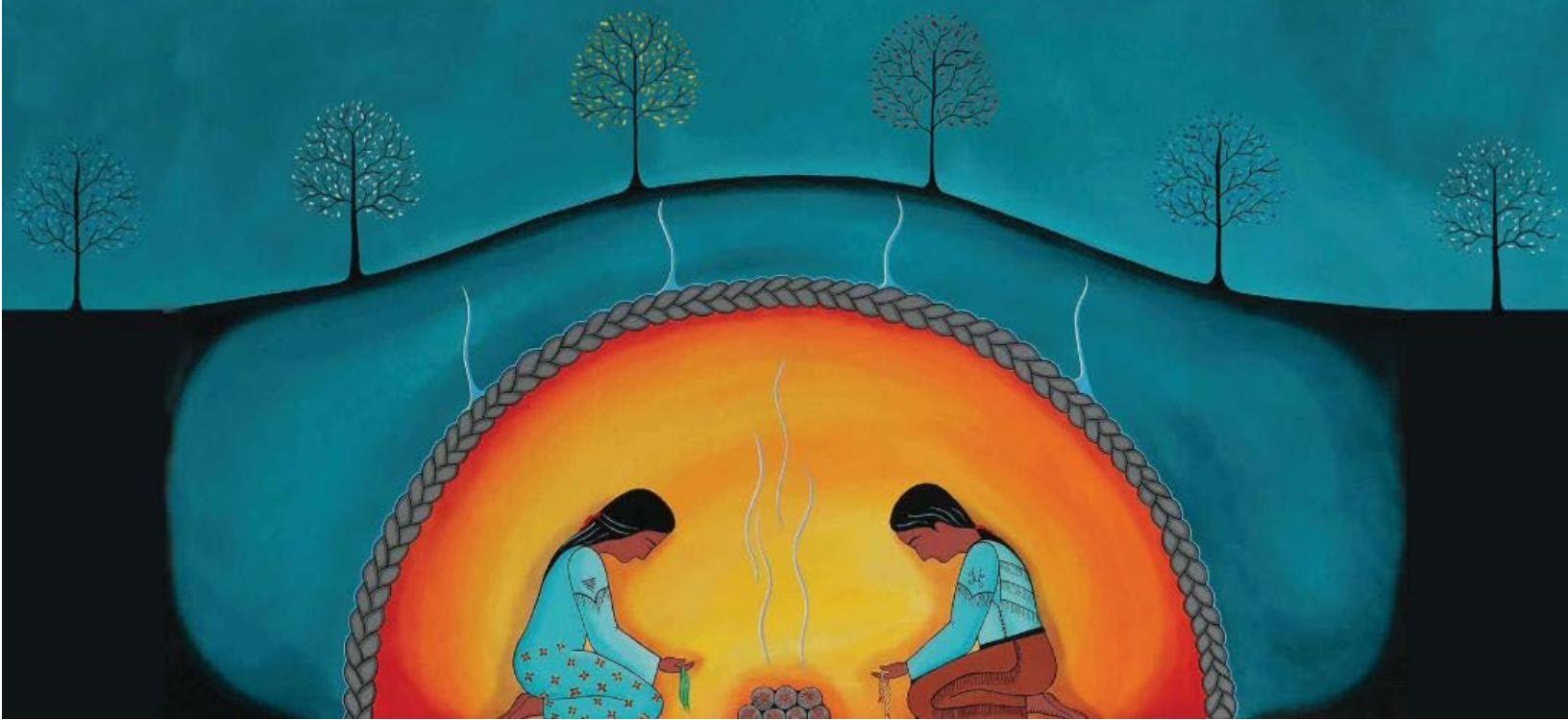

**FIRST NATIONS HOUSING AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**



This three part webinar was delivered by Kelly Francis, FNHP. A summary of the webinar follows:

Employing a collaborative approach to the way we work with people on issues or situations that affect their lives may be seen as unnecessary by some. They may see community engagement as a costly added step when planning a new project or service or altering a policy or program. But we have all been witness to occasions when a segment of a particular community protests loudly against a change or something new, resulting in delays, confusion, frustration, and fractured relationships. Doesn't it make sense to take steps in an attempt to avoid that?

Community engagement is a way for us to build relationships and trust between decision-makers and community members. It empowers people by giving them a voice on decisions that may affect them – it provides them with opportunities to share their thoughts, ideas and comments on proposals for change or development before those things take shape. It gives community members a feeling of “ownership” of the end result. Community engagement is also a way to share information and educate community members. Doesn't it make more sense to share facts and data at the outset rather than allow fiction and rumour to rapidly circulate in the community, taking on a life of its own?

In truth, community engagement is about getting people involved and promoting sustainable decisions. As a bonus, it allows us to capitalize on the old adage that says two heads are better than one. Many First Nations staff have shared that a great idea they acted upon actually originated with a community member. That's a spinoff advantage of the process that just might happen to you.
